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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Education plays a very significant role in the making and shaping of an individual in particular and a society in general. When it comes to higher education of an individual, it is pertinent to mention that this is a powerful tool to take one to greater heights in his/her life. It is taken to be a passport to success by providing jobs in government and corporate sector. It imparts skills to be successful in commercial sector also. Keeping this very purpose in mind, Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda is steadily marching ahead to serve the nation. Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda was initially started in 2013 as a Govt. College (Affiliated to Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak) teaching up to bachelor's Classes. Named as Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda it was situated near Kundli Manesar Palwal Highway (KMP), about 5 K.M. away from Kharkhoda Town towards Delhi. This College has proved to be a boon to the students of all villages around Kharkhoda town. Govt. decided to construct a new College building at Village Pipli and College shifted in 2016 from the Kharkhoda ITI. A new campus came into existence with Arts faculties and commerce faculties in the new building w.e.f. the session 2016. The College was renamed as Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda on 08.06.2015 as per the instructions of state government. The College is currently affiliated to Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak. Presently, B.A., B.Com courses are being run in the College.

Vision

The institution works on clearly set vision and goals which are achieved in a systematic way. The insignia of College has "Pawaka Na Saraswati" which means "Goddess Saraswati, make us pure and pious with the gift of Education" which, in turn, helps to build the character of a person, the character of the nation. Institutional Weakness

- Limited Fund and grant for infrastructure development. The College depends on department of higher education panchkula for funds to develop infrastructure, College cannot raise the fund independently.
- Lack of budget for sport activities. The College situated in rural area and this area known as talent hub for sport activity our students participate and win position at inter University and National level, we participate and win 30-40 positions at inter level College in various games but we do not receive sufficient sport grant from department, what we receive from students as sports fund, we have to deposit 50% of that amount to the concerned university there for we have very less amount to develop the sports infrastructure and conducting sports activities.
- Girl Students need to motivate to participate in all Activities

- Only pass courses are available.
- The College spreads in 11 acre vast area but we have only one gardener to maintain the Landscape around.
- The College currently does not have parking shed for students as well as staff.
- The College has to face frequent power cuts as this is a rural area College, hence electricity supply is given as per policy that to supply to rural areas.
- The dropout rate is higher in this College as students move towards private jobs rather than completion of their studies.

Institutional Opportunity

- The College has more than 11 acre land to Develop the infrastructure like Parking shed , solar power plant , New building for new courses & various sports ground.
- Opportunity in organizing more seminar, conferences, F.D.P. for faculty development
- Need to improve computer proficiency among rural students.
- Introduction of more Diploma/Certificate courses.
- Explore alumni to academic and placement activities.
- College is situated in rural area with fabulous sports talent in rural youth, we have opportunity to help youth of this area to provide platform for sports activities.
- Government of Haryana has allocated land to establish IMT just opposite to our College, we will have more opportunity in future to sign M.O.U. with various company I.M.T. for job placement & training of our student

Institutional Challenge

- Absence of Post Graduate Courses also a reason for the dropout of students who wants to pursue integrated degrees(UG + PG.)
- Orthodox thinking of parents for girls education.
- Frequently power cut and absence of Hot Line.
- Absence of well connected transportation facility eventually leads to lessor enrollment and attendance of girl students.
- Saline taste of ground water & insufficient water supply also create hurdle in making campus greener and environment friendly.
- Less purchasing power in absence of Quotation which is Rs. 500/- Only.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Saheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College, Kharkhoda is affiliated to Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak, follow the curriculum designed by it. At the beginning of academic session the College prepares the academic calendar in alignment with the University academic calendar which consists of curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities for effective implementation and delivery of curriculum. The Principal addresses the

newly admitted students in “Induction Program”. This program orients the students about facilities and welfare schemes available, code of conduct and discipline, add-on courses and extra-curricular activities. There is timetable committee which prepares the timetable facultywise as per workload for the academic session. A comprehensive teaching plan is prepared by every teacher which includes the delivery of lectures, tutorials and practical. ICT is used for effective teaching by the teachers of various departments. Unit Tests , Assignments, seminars and project are given to the students under the supervision of the faculty. The faculty members encourage the students to read the reference books and take use of e- resources to update and enhance their subject knowledge. The departments organize study tours, excursions, field project and industrial visits for students’ exposure to practical knowledge. Guest lectures of eminent faculty members from other institutions are arranged to give exposure of the current trends and the latest subject knowledge. Add-on Courses and Soft Skill programs are conducted for the overall development of the student. Special emphasis is laid on inculcating ethical practices and human values among the students by organizing various extra-curricular activities like Declamation, Nukkad Natak, Gender Sensitization programme, Poster Making Competition on water conservation, Awareness programmes on drug abuse, Blood Donation Camps, Cleanliness Drive, etc. Mentor-Mentee scheme is implemented for identifying problems of the students regarding academic, social and financial issues. The College collects the feedback from the faculty, students, alumni and parents and it was analysed using different parameters.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The most important thing in teaching learning process of this institute is ability of its teachers to create enthusiasm, ignite passion and generate curiosity among the students. The teachers are deputed off and on to participate in conferences, seminars and symposia, orientation and refresher courses to boost their teaching skills and make their teaching more innovative and effective. The admission process of the College is managed by admission committee which is responsible for designing admission forms and prospectus and counseling of the students at the entry level. The admission in various courses is based on the merit in the qualifying examination with special concession to SC/ST and girls. To cater to the diverse needs of the students various subject combinations are offered so that the students can choose the combination of subjects according to their liking and competence. The admission process is followed by academic calendar which facilitates students for participation in various curricular and co-curricular activities. The time table committee designs time table, providing specific time slots for all subjects. The whole process of education is student-centric, and different units are framed in the College to facilitate different aspects. The College has an active Placement Cell, Women Cell, NSS & YRC etc. The teaching plan is given well in advance to enable the students to be mentally prepared for the topics to be taught. During the lectures, interactive question answer sessions are arranged. As a second step, assignments are given to be submitted by the student within stipulated period. Group discussions as a part of evaluation is incorporated for interactive learning. Team presentations are organized for proper team work and collaborative learning.

IQAC of the College supported by the senior faculty members monitors all the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the College and ensures to provide all the necessary support to teachers and students for better teaching and learning process.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Currently the UG program is running in College therefore there is little scope to carry out research activities by the students of College. The College has provided all facilities to faculty members and encourages them to

involve in quality research and as a result of it most of the faculty members have completed their Ph.D. and research papers have been published in reputed National/ International / refereed / non-refereed journals during the last five years.

The College has motivated their students and provides platform for extension and social responsibility through the activities such as campaign against illiteracy, AIDS awareness, cleanliness drives. etc. The College has promoted the Idea of plantation for green environment and cleanliness; awareness programmes to wipe out social evils through its NSS awareness activities. Various activities like use of helmet, to comply with traffic rules, blood donation camp, health awareness (Yoga) are being organized regularly. Seminar and Extension Lectures are conducted throughout the year by inviting people having expertise in their fields.

The College also motivates the students for their involvement in various social movements / activities through NSS and NCC units which promote citizenship rules and social awareness movement . During NSS camps, the students come in contact with the villagers and inspire them to make their environment pollution free and aware them about the various welfare schemes run by the State Govt. as well as Centre Govt.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Shaheed dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda always takes positive measures and initiatives to make the teaching-learning environment more effective and efficient by providing adequate academic infrastructure. The College encompasses a well-maintained campus spread over 11 acres of serene green land. The existing infrastructural facilities are utilized both for conducting theory and practical classes.

The College has 21 spacious classrooms for conducting theory and practical classes to cater the needs of students. All laboratories (Defence Studies, Physical Education, Psychology, Geography, and Computer-cum-Language lab) are well equipped and well maintained as per UGC/ Affiliating University & Haryana Govt. norms. The College has three Smart Class Room with ICT enabled equipment and also has two ICT enabled class room for students. The College has a Multipurpose Hall with the seating capacity of 250 persons to conduct conferences, seminars, Indoor games and workshops for students and faculty members. College has well equipped central library , fully automated with soul software 2.0

The Institution has adequate facilities for sports/ games (indoor, outdoor) with a vast playground with four hundred metre tracks for athletics and cater to the needs of various outdoor games. As far as cultural activities are concerned, at the beginning of the session, talent search/hunt programme is organized by the College to bring out the hidden talent of the students through different activities like General Song, Solo Dance, Folk Dance, Rituals, Painting, Slogan Writing, Mime, Rangoli, Haryanvi Skit, Mono-Acting etc.

The average annual expenditure for purchase of books/e-books and subscription to journals/e- journals during the last five years is Rs. 161558. The Number of teachers and students using library per day over last one year is 40. The College has 50 MBPS internet bandwidth through lease line as well as Wi-Fi. *Also the Student - Computer ratio in College is 14:1*

Student Support and Progression

The College is always ready to serve students to support them in each and every dimension which can lead to overall development of the students.

The College offers a wide range of prizes such as academic prizes, sports prizes, prizes for achievement in extracurricular activities (NSS/ Cultural/ subject societies). Apart from these prizes, awards and many kinds of scholarships are also granted to students belonging to different categories such as Post-Matric SC Scholarship, Post-Matric BC Scholarship, under graduate girl's merit scholarship, meritorious incentive scheme. Students are provided financial help through welfare schemes like Earn While You Learn (EWYL) scheme in which they can earn by providing their services in library, laboratory, offices etc in their vacant periods. The College staff also provide fees to poor students as donation.

Since education is not only to acquire the bookish knowledge, the College also tries to inculcate capabilities in young academicians and give platform to express their thoughts in a lucid manner. The College also provides a platform for overall development of students by organizing various cultural and sports events throughout the year. Departmental activities are also designed in such a manner which can enhance capabilities and provide confidence in students, Capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives are taken from time to time so that more empowered and skilled human resources can be provided to the society.

Further, the Placement Cell of the College organizes extension lectures and workshops providing information about employment opportunities in this modern era and help students to grab the real time opportunities of placement. Grievance Redressal Cell of the College helps students to resolve their grievances related to sexual harassment and ragging cases etc. The College also has career counseling cell so that proper guidance for future career of students can be given a professional direction. Time to time alumni association meets are given stage to share experiences and cherish the attachments with their College and batch mates so in order to build strong associations.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision of the College is to provide higher educational opportunities to the students residing in the city and adjacent village areas. The College possesses the culture of decentralization and participative management for the smooth functioning. The Principal ensures that power is delegated at each and every step of policy-making, planning, execution and evaluation. The College broadly focuses on academic and non-academic activities for the holistic development of the students. Being a government College, the College is governed by the policies the Department of Higher Education Haryana which issues regulations, policies framework from time to time to carry out the administrative activities of the College as per the needs and requirements and directs the principals of Govt. Colleges for the compliance. To attain and maintain the quality of an institution, it is necessary to frame the policies/ programmes, practices and execute them in true spirit by the all the pillars of the institution. There are considerable number of parameters to assess the performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff. The College Formulates the internal audit Committee time to time for the purpose of auditing. Effective and efficient use of available financial resources is checked by regular annual Audit. The committee scrutinises all record and data and makes suggestions based on their findings. Bursar appointed in the College checks all vouchers, Bills on regular basis and Internal audit. The bursar checks and verifies all vouchers of transactions with reference to sanctioned budget and availability of the funds of the College. The College adopts well planned strategies for mobilizing funds and optimum utilization of resources. In addition to this, the College receives membership fees from the alumni and fees from students. The govt grant is received under pre-defined Heads. The Major Heads include Salary, Placement Cell, Earn While You Learn scheme, Women Cell, Lab Upgradation, Material and Supply, Sports, Library, Office Expenses etc. The IQAC of the College deals with the quality measures like preparation of academic and activity calendar, formation of Mentor-Mentee Groups and ensure weekly mentor classes, formation of alumni association, upgradation of existing infrastructure, maintain the records of teachers who attended OC/RC/STC/Workshop/FDP etc, organizing seminar/workshop

for capacity building of teaching and non-teaching staff, to finalize API Performa of teaching staff etc.

The College also conducts the periodic programmes regarding constitutional obligations, adherence to code of conduct and also celebrates national and international commemorative days and festivals. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>A key pillar of National education policy is liberal education which sensitizes students to the fundamentally multi-disciplinary/interdisciplinary, the significant principle which merges with the element of choice is the introduction of Multi-disciplinary studies. Students are now free to pick subjects from either stream that might interest them pursue them as major and minor courses. Marketing would be benefitted from studying behavioral psychology to understand how the customer makes buying decisions. Similarly political scientists could make use of Mathematical knowledge to analyze the results of their quantitative researches. The flexibility to choose subjects from sciences and humanities with the ability to also learn fine arts and sports will give students a wide range of subjects to choose without the restrictions they faced earlier. With creative combination of subject's cutting edge curriculum, flexible options and multiple entry and exit options during the undergraduate course students can explore their areas of interest and also choose careers of their choice. In addition this kind of approach will foster intellectual curiosity, a critical thought process self- reflection, leadership and team work skills a sense of commitment, professionalism and a heightened sensitivity to one's socio-culture environment. The educational institutes which are situated in remote areas and for rural areas will also be benefitted from the option of multidisciplinary education, sometimes the students of these areas cannot avail the option to take up as a subject in which they have interest. Now they have opportunity to take other subjects and stream and will be able to fulfill the dreams and would be enriched with more skill and professionally efficient.</p>

Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>The Academic bank of credit framework is part of national education policy 2020 and will allow higher education institutions to maintain a digital repository of credits earned by students under ABC, Students can choose to study one course in a year in one institution and switch to another one the next year. Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) is a virtual/digital store house that contains the information of the credits earned by individual students throughout their learning journey. It will enable students to open their accounts and give multiple options for entering and leaving Colleges and universities. ABC will act as an authentic reference to check the credit record of any student in any course. It is a major instrument for facilitating multidisciplinary and holistic education and multiple entry and exit in higher education. Credit System under National Education policy 2020 means the standard methodology for calculating one</p>

	<p>hour of the theory or one hour of tutorial or two hours of laboratory work per week for a semester (13 to 15 Week) ? One semester credit hour is defined a weekly minimum of one hour in class (or other required education meeting like lab, studio etc). Plus two hours of out of class work formally i.e .A credit score should required 4 class room hour and 8 hours of out of class hours each week in a 15 week term. ? 40 credits will be needed for a certificate, 80 to get diploma, 120 for a bechelor degree & 160 creditor for a degree with honors/research. As per the draft 1 credit is equallent to one hours of teaching or 2 hours of practical session or field work. Function of ABC 1. Academic Bank will be accountable for opening, closing and validating the academic accounts of students. 2. It will carry out tasks such as credit accumulation, credit verification, credit transfer/redemption of students. 3. The courses include online and distance mode courses offered by the government and institutes. 4. The validity of these academic credits earned by students will be up to seven years and students can redeem these credits. 5. The credits can be redeemed and students can seek admission directly in the second year at any university. The validity will be up to seven years, hence, students will have to rejoin within seven years. Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda is situated in rural area of distt. Sonipat, Haryana, 90% of the students belong to villages and come with family background of agriculture & labour, some time they can not continue their education/degree/diploma with some reasons. This credit system will help the students of rural background to leave any degree/diploma with credit points and would be able to re-entered to complete their education with the help of these credit points within the period of 7years.</p>

In this way the learners are able to find out their purpose and their capabilities, Integrated learning should be provided to the students, They should have knowledge of each discipline and this should be applied to higher education for the students skill development. New education policy is not a circular but a Mahayog to lay the foundation of New system/country. Education policy used to focus on what you think. Now let's focus on how to think. We have to make our student global citizens and at the same time they should stay connect with their roots. With the help of New education policy students follow their passion with their interest at any stage. Students need to develop critical thinking. Students should map their interest ability and demand. Creating a national research foundation so that research & innovation can take place. Project of skill development can be implemented in every education institutions, As our College is situated in rural area and fit for implement Of the skill development project. Continual quality improvement (CQI) & monitoring There are few key issues in outcome based education are class size, expectations of learner, characteristics and reality, teaching practice & evaluation, & student motivation were the most commonly discussed challenges self-reported instructor characteristics and the perceived roll of the instructor often contradicted OBE model of learning. There are few benefits of outcomes based education (OBE) for students. It brings clarity among the teachers and students. Every student has the flexibility and freedom of learning in their ways. There is more than one method of learning it helps to reduced comparison among the students as everyone has a different target. As per as the role of teachers in outcome based education is OBE affirms teachers as facilitators rather than lecturer. In this model, teachers guide students through learning with Scuff folded & hands-on activities to support student engagement with new material and encourage the application of developing knowledge and skills. Outcome based education system is basically student centered, OBE it-self is not a teaching style or method. It is a principle designing your teaching in an effective way that enables learning happens and help student to achieve the intended learning outcomes. Therefore it is important in OBE is (what is learned) rather than (what is taught).</p>

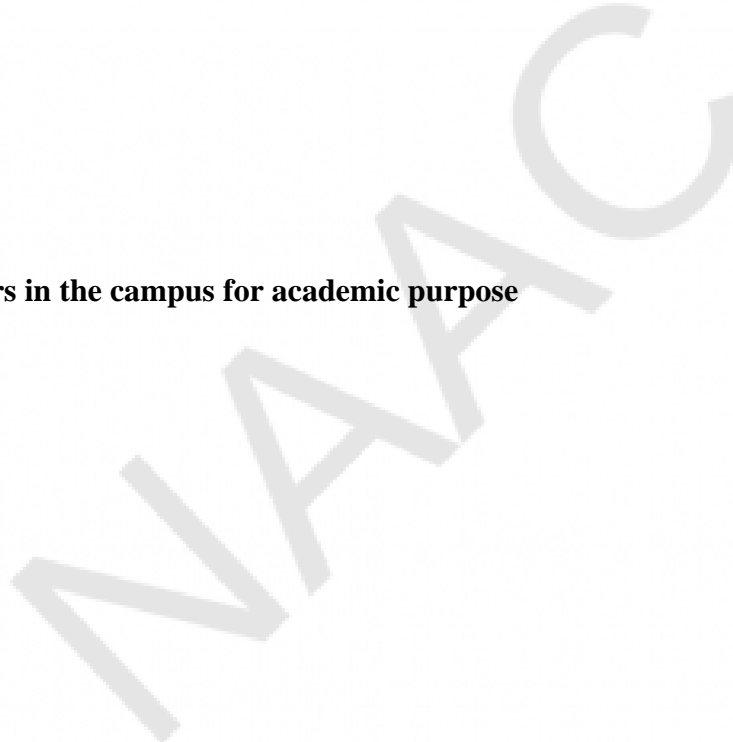

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College, Kharkhoda, affiliated to Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak, follow the curriculum designed by it. At the beginning of academic session the College prepares the academic calendar in alignment with the University academic calendar which consists of curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities for effective implementation and delivery of curriculum. We undertake following measures for effective delivery of the university curriculum at College level. The Principal addresses the newly admitted students in "Induction Program". A comprehensive teaching plan is prepared by every teacher which includes the delivery of lectures, tutorials and practicals. ICT is used for effective teaching by the teachers of various departments. Unit Tests are conducted periodically and its results are displayed and discussed with the students in the class room. Assignments, seminars and project are given to the students under the supervision of the faculty. The faculty members encourage the students to read the reference books and take use of e-resources to update and enhance their subject knowledge. Remedial classes are given to slow learners and merit mission concept is implemented for advance learners. Additional facilities such as extra book issue and personal counseling are provided to slow and advanced learners. College organises special programmes for slow and advanced learners such as workshops, different co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The departments organize study tours, excursions, field project and industrial visits for students' exposure to practical knowledge. Guest lectures of eminent faculty members from other institutions are arranged to give exposure of the current trends and the latest subject knowledge. Certificate Courses and Soft Skill programs are conducted for the overall development of the student. College provides competitive books for competitive exams like NET, CTET, HTET, DSSB, PRT, PGT, TGT etc., Magazine like India Today, Yojna, Kurukshetra, Reader Digest, Pratiyogita Darpan etc. Book bank is also there to facilitate them. Mentor-Mentee scheme is implemented for identifying problems of the students regarding academic, social and financial issues. The College collects the feedback from the faculty, students, alumni and parents. The collected feedback is analyzed using different parameters and the performance of the students, faculty and institution is assessed. The achievements of objectives of the syllabus are measured through students' performance in Internal tests, Group discussions, Presentations and University examinations. Compliance of Continuous Internal Evaluation with Academic Calendar

1. Time-table – Time table committee prepares the time table as per the guidelines of affiliating university for the number of credit hours for each subject and the academic calendar prior to the start of the semester. Time-table is displayed on notice boards of every department.

2. Lesson Plan - After the allocation of subjects to faculty, lesson plan of each subject is prepared consisting of detailed teaching plan. It also contains the assignments to be uploaded on every scheduled date of academic calendar.

Field visits/ Excursions are organized to connect the theoretical knowledge with the practical one. Interactive sessions are organized by the departments from time to time to make the students' learning more effective. Various departmental activities like quizzes, seminars are also organized with the objective to ensure the maximum participation of the students.

The guiding principle behind using these student-centric methods is to ensure that students can link theory with practice, apply their knowledge and develop new skills. Workshops also develop creativity, innovation, and adaptation of ideas to yield multiple need-based solutions to meet the challenges of contemporary society.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Internal assessment for all courses and subjects is done strictly as per university guidelines. The College conducts internal assessment throughout the session. The class teachers ensure the consistency in performance of the students and constantly monitor the results. The internal assessment marks 20 for UG (B.A/B.Com) classes are awarded as under:

1.Class Test: 10 marks

2.Assignment: 5 marks

3.Attendance: 5 marks

- Surprise tests are conducted to check the consistency of students in studies once or twice in a semester as per the discretion of class teacher. The answer-sheets are returned to the students after the assessment with proper instructions and valuable suggestions. The teachers show the weakness of the students in the answer papers. It helps them in understanding the mistakes made in the papers.
- Assignment offer teachers a chance to assess students in more innovative ways.
- To ensure transparency, the students are provided with internal assessment schedule from time to time. Final score is also put on the Notice Board. The students may peruse their score and give their feedback after checking their answer-sheets. If any discrepancy is found that is immediately addressed/corrected before sending the score to the University. The teachers counsel the weak

students to guide them for the improvement and the tips for the best performance.

- Allotment of marks is decided by the Class teacher and checked by the HODs and the Principal before sending the same to the University. After evaluation record of assessment is maintained by the concerned teacher
- Throughout the semester academi performance of the students is evaluated by the teachers through various means such as performance in class test, presentations, group discussions. project reports etc.
- Field survey in geography let students to have actual experience of locationand sensitise them to the environment and community.
- The University in final Mark-sheet of the students adds the awarded score based on the assessment decided as per points 1 to 3 above.

This way a transparent mechanism is devised to counsel and guide the students update them for academics and pattern of examinations, their performance and improvement tips and finally make them ready for final examinations.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time bound and efficient. The College strictly adheres to the academic calendar as per the University norms. Working as a Centre of Excellence, the institution is committed to ensure value education and provides an academic atmosphere free from unfair-means. The menace of unfair means is totally curbed down with the help of staff members and university authorities. The principal has constituted a committee of senior faculty members to check and control any type of malpractice notice during the examination.

The College has a well-designed mechanism to deal with examination related grievances. The College has adopted three tier system to address the examination related grievances of the students. Depending upon the nature of grievances, the three tiers include Department/faculty level, College administration level . The department level grievances are related to their internal assessment marks in their Minor tests and assignments. Every teacher displays the marks of internal assessment on notice board to have full transparency in the system and the students who are not satisfied with their marks given by the teachers are advised to contact their teacher in-charge and resolve their problems. At the College level, a committee comprising of senior teachers has been constituted to take up the grievances of the students regarding filling of online examination forms, result-late issues, re-evaluation issues and any discrepancy observed in the mark sheet of the students. Besides, a senior teacher has been assigned the duty of registrar for the purpose of smooth conduct of minor tests during the academic session. Apart from these, Discipline committees are appointed by the College administration for the smooth and fair conduct of university

semester examinations. The College administration ensures the proper and timely display of exam related notices such as date sheet, any revision in the date sheet, issuance of admit cards and code of conduct on College Notice Board. At University Level, grievances related to semester examinations conducted by the affiliating University include wrong/non-declaration of result, non-receipt of awards, showing absent in examination, misprinting/anomalies in the DMC, anomalies in the results are taken up by the College administration and forwarded to the concerned University Officials in time with the request to resolve the issue at the earliest.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The College always takes positive measures and initiatives to make the teaching-learning environment more effective and efficient by providing adequate academic infrastructure. The College provides proper facilities for theoretical as well as practical classes. The College encompasses a well-maintained campus spread over 11 acres of serene green land. The existing infrastructural facilities are utilized both for conducting theory and practical classes. The detail of facilities is given as under:

Classrooms: The College has sufficient number of well furnished, well ventilated, spacious 21 classrooms for conducting theory and practical classes to cater the needs of students.

Laboratories: All laboratories (Defence Studies, Physical Education, Psychology, Geography, and Computer-cum-Language lab) are well equipped and well maintained for carrying out curriculum-oriented practical classes. All the laboratories are established as per UGC/ Affiliating University & Haryana Govt. norms. Practicals are conducted for the duration of three periods for each batch. Batches are made for the group of 15 to 20 students, One batch consists 20 students for first year and one batch consists 15 students for second and third year as per the direction of Higher Education Department of Haryana.

Technology Enabled Teaching and Learning: The College has one Smart Class Room with ICT enabled equipment such as Projector, Computer and Wi-Fi enabled Smart Board. The College has two ICT enabled room for student. The College has also ordered for two Smart Class Room's equipment, hopefully it will deliver and install within two months.

Multipurpose Hall: The College has a Multipurpose Hall with the seating capacity of 250 persons to conduct conferences, seminars, and workshops for students and faculty members.

Departmental Offices/Reading Room: The College has five research cells for various department. One for Commerce, one for Defence Studies and Physical, one for History, Psychology and Political Science, one for Geography and Economics, one for Hindi and English.

Computers: College administration is always ready to take necessary steps to fulfil the computer requirement of teachers, students & departments. At present, College has Forty two computers along with a number of printers and internet facility and One Laptop for Principal.

Library: College has well equipped central library with reference and text books, magazines, newspapers etc. The College library provides Book Bank facility where students can borrow the books.

Common Room for Girls: This is separately available for female students, where they can sit in their leisurely time. The Girl's Common Room includes sanitary vending machines, washrooms (adjoint to girls common room) and Dustbins etc.

History and Haryanvi Dharohar Museum

The College has established History and Haryanvi Dharohar Museum under the Deptt. of History. The Museum is a showcase of unique archaeological, cultural and architectural heritage of Haryana.

4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda offers a number of opportunities and resources to the students to develop the personality of its students.

Sports Facilities: The sports department of the Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College Kharkhoda is headed by an Assistant Professor of Physical Education and various sports activities are conducted by the sports board consisting of senior faculty members. The College has a vast playground with four hundred metre tracks for athletics and to cater the needs of various outdoor games. Cultural facilities: As far as cultural activities are concerned the College has earned a reputation in the region. Physical Facilities: The College has adequate physical facilities including laboratories, classrooms, computers, washrooms, office for various committee incharges, drinking water facility (with RO and water cooler), playgrounds, multipurpose hall, smart classrooms, solar power palnt, inverter and generator set etc. are available for all round development of students. The students are charged for these facilities at the time of admission as per the norms of the University and state govt. Besides, recurring grants are allocated by the Department of Higher Education for the maintenance of physical infrastructure. The College follows a systematic procedure for maintaining and utilising the available physical infrastructure. In this regard Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College, Kharkhoda has formed infrastructure maintenance policy. As per the policy documentsThe College administration constitutes a committee of teachers/ office staff at the beginning of each academic session for the maintenance of physical infrastructure. The College administration always keeps vigilant eye on the quality of maintenance and requirement of infrastructure and equipment. The students of the College are also encouraged to provide their feedback regarding the status of available infrastructure as well as additional requirement thereof. The campus maintenance is monitored through surveillance cameras. The College ensures regular maintenance and upkeep of all infrastructural facilities. Furniture and equipments are purchased & repaired on regular basis as per the requirements. The College has appointed Trained Lab Attendants & ITI apprentices, Saksham Yuva personnel and Computer Network Assistants to ensure maintenance & regular support services related to computer hardware and software. The College awards Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMCs) to external agencies/private vendors for the maintenance of computers, LAN, servers, printers, projectors, scanners, CCTV Cameras and biometric attendance system etc. All the details of physical infrastructure are

maintained in stock registers. Physical stock verification of all the entities is done annually by the committees of faculty members appointed by the College administration at the end of each financial year. Instruments in labs, RO, Overhead Water Tanks, Inverters, Generators etc. are got serviced regularly.

Departmental Laboratories:

The College has well maintained departmental laboratories. Under the supervision of head of the concerned department, lab attendants (as per the availability) maintain the efficiency of the College laboratories and accessories. The concerned head also purchases equipment to improve the lab by using Lab augmentation grant, which is provided by government every year.

Academic Facilities:

The College has devised a system of optimal utilization of academic infrastructure. To improve the quality of teaching and learning process the College has also ordered for two Smart Class Room's equipment, hopefully it will deliver and install within two months. All the faculty members are using latest teaching learning techniques and the administration is also has sheer dedication to improve the academic infrastructure.

Library:

The College has a well-maintained library with a collection of 4243 books. The College receives an annual grant from the state government to update and upgrade the library with the passage of time. Furthermore, the College collects a library fee from students at the time of admission in accordance with state government regulations. The grant/library fund is used to buy books, newspapers, magazines, furniture, computer systems, and other items. The College library is equipped with the "SOUL" Software and the students are provided ID cards to get the books issued. The academic infrastructure available in the library is well maintained by library advisory committee constituted by the College administration. For purchasing new books, the library advisory committee consults the Hods of each department and the books are purchased as per the recommendations of the Hods.

Language lab/ Computer Labs:

Good communication skills are indispensable for the success of any professional. If one wants to reach out to people, he or she has to speak their language. The English language, in particular, has become essential in the lives of young people who aspire to advance their careers anywhere in the world. English language learning has therefore become a must for every Indian student today. To keep this in mind the College has established a Language Lab/Computer Lab to improve the communication skills of the students because the language laboratory plays an important role in the language learning process.

Smart Class Rooms:

There are Wi-Fi enabled smart class rooms in the College campus. Maintenance works of this class rooms are assigned to a well-qualified office staff member having expertise in ICT.

Being a Government College, Shaheed Dalbir Singh Govt. College is governed by the policies of Higher Education Department, Govt. of Haryana. The Department of Higher Education Haryana issues regulations, policies framework from time to time to carry out the administrative activities of the College as per the needs and requirements and directs the principals of Govt. Colleges for the compliance. Academic calendar is designed at the onset of each academic session as per the directions of affiliating university. The College has no direct recruitment, transfer and promotional policies. These are regulated at the directorate level. The affiliating university issues guidelines regarding intake capacity, admission schedule, examination forms schedule, schedule of submission of internal assessment and practical awards, date sheet of theory and practical exams, declaration of results and issuance of mark sheets and degrees. The College principal frames the mechanism and policies for an effective functioning of the College. The College receives different types of grants (Plan and Non-Plan) for material & supply, library, infrastructure upgradation, laboratory augmentation, scholarships etc. and plans strategies for the desired outcome with the active cooperation of all the stakeholders. Activity calendar is prepared by the College administration in consultation with head of departments/ Incharges and convener of different clubs and cells. At the beginning of each session the College principal assigns annual duties for the decentralization of powers and responsibilities for the smooth functioning of various academic and co-curricular activities. Principal is the administrator of the College who coordinates all the activities. Principal is also the ex-officio chairperson of the College's various committees who carries out various functions and activities of the College. The teachers are required to obtain minimum API score covering all the three categories of API Performance (Outstanding, Very Good, Good) for Career Advancement Scheme of UGC and Haryana Government. The API Performa of all the years (5 Years from Pay Band-1 further to Pay Band-4) for level upgradation duly verified by the IQAC and Principal of the College are sent to Haryana for its approval. Beside this, there is also a well-designed mechanism for teachers' appraisal system in which teachers must engage in research activities, publications of papers, participation in national and international seminars and conferences to easily attain their ACPs.

All teaching members are required to fill Annual Confidential report (ACR) containing the information about their responsibilities, extra classes for weak students', annual duties, research details and In- service training program and evaluated and assign a grade (Outstanding, Very Good, Good, Average, Below Average) by the principal. The ACR is submitted to Higher Education Haryana for necessary action. If the performance of a teacher is found below average, a disciplinary action is taken against his/her if the reply is not found satisfactory.

At the end of academic session feedback from the students is obtained containing the qualitative and quantitative parameters. The outcome of the feedback analysis is conveyed to each teacher for their encouragement and to take necessary

necessary.

Non-teaching staff: -

The performance of non-teaching staff is evaluated on the basis of duties and responsibilities assigned to them with efficiency and sincerity to carry out their duties. At the end of academic session, every non-teaching employee prepares a proforma which is verified by the HOD/Incharges in case of Laboratory attendant and further assessed and evaluated.

The College Formulates the internal audit Committee time to time for the purpose of auditing. Effective and efficient use of available financial resources is checked by regular annual Audit . The committee scrutinises all record and data and makes suggestions based on their findings . Apart from this Bursar appointed in the College checks all vouchers, Bills on regular basis Internal audit of the College is done by the College bursar.The bursar checks and verifies all vouchers of transactions with reference to sanctioned budget and availability of the funds of the College. The convenor of purchase committee along with the

bursar of the College keeps a strict vigil on the process of purchase. In addition to this, stock verification committees are appointed by the principal at the end of each financial year to check and verify the available stock. Furthermore, the committee recommends the stock items to be written off, if found unserviceable. The Cash Books are prepared by the office staff regularly and got verified by the bursar and counter signed by the principal.

The external audit of the institution is conducted as per the state Govt. instructions. The audit is conducted by the audit teams of Director Higher Education Haryana. After the conduct of audit, Chief Accounts Officer, Govt. of Haryana releases the audit report. Financial Audit includes: Funds received from government agencies like Social Welfare Departments towards SC, ST, OBC and other minority scholarships are audited. Funding towards Placement Cell, Women Cell, Earn While You Learn, Lab Upgradation, Material and Supply and Office Expenses (O/E) utilization certificate is submitted. The College collects fees from the students under various heads like Amalgamated Fund, University Fund, Red Cross Fund, Sports Fund, Development Fund, Library Fee, Electricity Charges, NSS/ NCC fee etc. Cash Books and Stock Registers are maintained for different funds separately. The expenditure bills of all the Govt. Grants are submitted to treasury and the amount is transferred through RTGS/ NEFT to the vendor's bank accounts.

The College administration ensures the quality and quantity of the supplied items. The College principal designates different convenors to keep and maintain the records of available resources (infrastructure).The convenors keep a vigilant eye on the proper utilization of these resources in an effective manner. The maintenance of these resources is ensured by the convenors and after the full utilization of the resources, these are disposed off by following the norms and regulation framed by the Condemnation and Disposal Department of Govt. of Haryana. All the transactions have transparency in terms of calling of the quotations at least from three vendors and billing to the supplier. The College administration ensures the proper utilization of these resources in an effective manner.

Safety and Security

The College is following all safety measures. The Internal Complaints Committee, Sexual Harassment Committee, Grievances and Redressal Committee has been constituted in the College from the beginning. These committees deal with the complaints from students, teaching and non-teaching members and takes necessary action to resolve their problems. The College has determined to create very healthy environment for students.

The College is committed to provide a safe and favourable working and academic environment to students as well as employees. All the teaching staff perform proctorial duties throughout the campus area- rooms, corridors, labs, playground, library, outside Girl's Common etc. to check and monitor the activities of the unsocial elements. The College administration is ready to take necessary action whenever needed against unsocial elements. The College has also concerned about ragging activities. An **Anti-Ragging Committee** is formed as per the guidelines of UGC. At the time of admission, the College administration has taken an affidavit from every student regarding their non- involvement in ragging activities. All the proctors are allocated a particular area for proctorial duties and they make sure that there are no instances of ragging and harassment of the students anywhere in the campus. Anti-ragging posters are displayed at all prominent places within the campus and women helpline numbers are prominently displayed. Due to the strict vigilance of the College administration, not a single incidence of ragging has been noticed in the College till date. Main gate is guarded and entry points are screened through CCTV cameras. Safety and security of all the students and staff is ensured through CCTV which are installed at many places. To ensure safe journey of the girl students studying in this Colleges; by the tired less efforts of College administration a pink bus service is provided by Haryana Roadways Sonapat depot.

Counselling: The College has consistently strived to address contemporary issues like gender, women concern, transgender issues, safety and security etc. through its academic content and extension lectures. The Women Cell of the College is very active in this direction. Self-defence classes are organized for the girl students for life skills and to face difficult situations and make them independent, active and aware. The girl students are also informed about DURGA SHAKTI App and toll-free no. 1091. Various activities are organized in the College for the girls' students to facilitate self-development and nurture them so that they become aware, active and energetic. Eminent personalities and experts are invited from the industries and social sectors to conduct workshops, sessions and lectures related to women safety and security such as self-defence, cyber-crime, police training and so on. Response:

Best Practice-1

Title of the Practice: Community Outreach Programme

Objectives of Practice

- a] To strengthen leadership skills among students.
- b] Create awareness within in the community.
- c] Increase the visibility of the programmes.
- d] Improve knowledge and attitude and health behaviours.
- e]To stimulate in the development of students " character and citizenship spirit by involving in community outreach activities.

The Context:

There are many challenging issues in the society that need to be resolved. Such problems are found more in the rural community. Due to less awareness in the villages, these problems are spreading fast. The most important issue among these major problems is environment. There are different types of pollutions that affects the weather in one way or the other in the village, whether it is burning of crop residues, burning of crackers and stubble burning. The second most important issue is the problem of literacy in the village, due to poor rural economy, poor children are not able to take education in schools and drops out many times, which needs to be curbed. Apart from this, gender inequality is also a big problem in the society, women have to face many challenges ranging from female feticide, which is a very big problem for any society, as a result, imbalance in sex ratio in rural areas has been registered in the society. Apart from this, youth is facing mental health problems. In this situation, dangerous diseases like AIDS, STD are also spreading in the society. In the context of all these problems the principal exercise of this college is to reduce all these problems.

Session 2020-21

Under the **Outreach Program** in the college, awareness campaigns were conducted in the village on various social topics.

In March-April 2021, a seminar was organized on behalf of the **Traffic Interpretation Center** of the college, in which the students and staff members were given information about traffic rules by the In-charge of the traffic station and to bring awareness to the traffic rules in the surrounding area. The Oath was administered to the students.

In this series, college students took out a rally in **Saidpur village** to spread awareness about traffic rules and road safety, in which all the villagers should wear helmet while driving, seat belt, do not drink alcohol, follow Traffic light rules. They were informed about the rules of not using of mobile phones while driving, etc. and they were also administered an oath to follow all these rules.

Old age home visit : Old age is a sensitive phase; elderly people need care and comfort to lead healthy life

without worries and anxiety. Older people are important members of any society and therefore have right to live in dignity in later life. Moreover older people possess the skills, Knowledge and experience to continue effectively to society, given the fact that the predicted increase is considered a valuable resource for all societies. Positive-Aging is term used to describe the process of maintaining a positive attitude in older age. Some researches have shown that having strong relationship, in general, are beneficial to senior health. Therefore students who worked under the "Earn While You Learn" scheme, visited an old age home and made a small effort to improve well-being of senior citizens.

Session 2019-20

To play the role of a responsible citizen for voter awareness in the assembly elections by the college principal Mrs. Kiran Saroha expressed her views through the newspaper as an intellectual. She told that everyone should take a pledge that everyone should exercise their voting rights by identifying right and wrong by giving the introduction of an aware citizen thoughtfully.

On October 18, 2019, a seven-day camp was started by the NSS students of the college at **Saidpur Village**. NSS Volunteers made aware to ban plastic by calling plastic a threat to the environment.

On October 21, 2019, under the NSS camp, NSS volunteers carried out the work of transporting the helpless and old people to the polling station. The students were made aware of the harms caused to human health by pollution, along with this, the students appealed for everyone's cooperation in keeping the environment safe.

On February 8, 2020, a rally was taken out on the topic of environmental protection in the **Village Jatola** adopted by the college, in which the students of the college took out a rally on bicycles till the village Jatola and did the work of making everyone aware.

Session 2018-19

During the camp in **Pipli Village** by the **NSS Volunteers** of the college, the villagers were informed about the importance of cleanliness inside and outside the public places and houses under the **Cleanliness Campaign** and gave complete information about the cleanliness campaign. Under the **Beti Bachao Beti Padhao** program, all the girls of the village were given the message of education more & more, and explained the importance of participation of daughters in the upliftment of the society. They also went to the nearby village of **Rampur** and gave the message of cleanliness through street plays and explained its importance to the villagers so that the surrounding environment can be kept clean.

On 13 July, the students of the college gave the message of cleanliness in **Sohti Village** under the **Swachh Bharat Abhiyan** through street plays, posters, songs and banners etc. and made the villagers aware about the environment. Students took out a rally in the village and cleaned and through that gave the message of cleanliness.

Evidence of Success

In the adopted village Jatola under the outreach program, and some villages like Sohti, Saidpur, Pipli, Rampur etc. have become clean under the cleanliness campaign. People there also now started taking great care in cleaning the surrounding area, the students planted trees in the adopted villages and motivated the people of the village to plan and protect the trees. As a result, more and more saplings were planted by

people in these villages, trees were taken care of. This activity preserved our life to some extent. Our volunteers organized rallies on “**Say No to Plastic**”, “**Stop Burning of Crop Residue**”, took out **Prabhat Pheris**. The people of these villages no longer use polythene bags and have stopped burning crop residues.

Problem Encountered

The people of the rural community, being conservative, participated in less number of rallies and other campaigns and showed less interest in the awareness campaigns run by the students. Whereas the students of the college worked very hard to motivate and make the people of the village aware through various campaigns. Students through rally talks, plays told about Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, water conservation, non-burning of crop residues, ban on plastic products and cleanliness message. Along with this, through various programs, they took information about the various problems faced in the daily life of the villagers and tried to solve them. Motivated the women of the village to read more and more. Efforts were made to do better work in the Government College in spite of limited resources.

Best Practice-2:

Title: Eco-friendly and Green Campus

Objectives of the Practice:

- **Tree Plantation Programmes, Beautification & Maintenance of green area of College**
- **Water conservation/ Rain water harvesting system**
- **Environment Friendly Behavior (Car Pooling)**
- **Creating awareness about environment pollution**
- **Save energy through LED bulbs/tube lights**

Practices:

(i) Tree Plantation

- Trees make life nicer. It has been shown that spending time among trees and green spaces reduces the amount of stress that we carry with us.
- Plantation plays a significant role in absorption of storm and rainwater for maintenance of ground water table, prevention of soil erosion and eun-off and encourage growth of natural habitat for flora and fauna.
- Trees offer many environmental benefits. Trees reduce the urban heat island effect through evaporative cooling and reducing the amount of sunlight that reaches parking area and building.
- Trees improve our air quality by filtering harmful dust and pollution such as ozone, carbon monoxide, and sulfur dioxide from the air we breathe. We plant trees to provide shade and beautify our landscape.

- Beautiful parks has been maintained in the College, which further enhances the beauty of the College. Plantation is done by the College from time to time and the students are motivated. Different -different Plants and trees of fruits, flowers and herbs have been planted different areas of the College B.A. and B.Com. Environmental Science is taught as a compulsory subject in the second semester.

On 25 August 2018, three days **Raksha Bandhan festival** was celebrated in the College. On the last day of which all the students and staff members took oath to raise their voice against the harassment of women and to save trees by tying the defense thread on the trees (Vraksha Sutra).

(ii) Rain Water Harvesting System :

All living things including plants, animals and human beings need water to live and to carry out different cellular activities. Water is a precious, essential and a biotic component of the ecosystem. Today we all are heading towards the scarcity of water, and this is mainly because of the lack of water conservation and pollution of water bodies. So, College decided not to waste a drop of water and start conserving water for further use.

The rainwater harvesting system is one of the best methods practiced and followed to support the conservation of water. Today, scarcity of good quality water has become a significant cause of concern. However, rainwater, which is pure and of good quality, can be used for irrigation, washing, cleaning, bathing, cooking and also for other livestock requirements. Rainwater harvesting is a sustainable process that helps in preserving water for future needs. Water scarcity is a major concern in today's scenario. The process of rainwater harvesting is a good way to conserve water. Storing rainwater helps in recharging the aquifers. It helps in preventing urban flooding due to excess rain. The stored water can be used for irrigation practices in farming region. The water can be used for daily use and help in reducing water bills in the towns and cities.

The College has vast built up area which is known as administration block and teaching block. On the request of College administration it has made a policy in which the Public Works Department, Government of Haryana took initiative to set up rain water harvesting system in College area. Now we have four rain water collection area In College. All areas of College has been covered in this system. The three main components of Rain Water harvesting system include catchment, collection and optimal use of Rain water.

(iii) Car Pooling :

Car-pooling is the sharing of car journeys so that more than one person travels in a car, and prevents the need for others to have to drive to the same location themselves. By having more people using one vehicle, carpooling reduces each person's travel costs such as: fuel costs, tolls, and the stress of driving. Carpooling is also a more environmentally friendly and sustainable way to travel as sharing journeys reduces air pollution, carbon emissions, traffic congestion on the roads, and the need for parking spaces.

So our College teachers and other staff members use car pooling technique for Environmental Friendliness to reduce pollution, stress.

(iv) Save energy

To save energy and light consumption LED Bulbs and Tube lights used in college campus area. Because LED is a highly energy-efficient lighting technology, and has the potential to fundamentally change the future of lighting. The energy usage of LED Lamps is much lesser than that of CFL lamps or incandescent bulbs.

Evidence of Success

Every year in the college, various environmental programs and awareness campaigns to reduce pollution showed enthusiasm among the students and the surrounding people to reduce pollution. The students planted more and more trees to keep the environment clean and the campus green. Made a significant contribution to making The students showed great enthusiasm in various types of rallies to address water conservation, air pollution and other environmental problems. Success has been achieved in conserving water through water harvesting system in the campus. The use of LED bulbs and florescent tubes in the college resulted in savings in the monthly electricity bills of the college. Saving petrol and diesel through car pools helped in curbing air pollution and also saved money. Thus all these practices were successful in keeping the campus green. It is hard work of students and Staff members that **Appreciation Certificate from Rampur ,Saidpur and Sohti Panchyat Smiti were awarded to the college for this specific service.**

Problem Encountered

Students made efforts to reduce environmental pollution in the surrounding areas and to make the college green, but students and staff members also faced some problems. Due to non-availability of bus stand around the college, the students had to face the inconvenience of traffic, due to which the students had to go on foot and hold rallies and other programs in the villages. Apart from this, being a government college, all kinds of funds were arranged by the Higher Education Department Government of Haryana. If we are given better facilities and resources, then all the students and teachers together can do different types of programs even better and can bring awareness in a powerful way.

Other Best Practices

Title of Best Practice-3 : Cashless or E-Transaction Facility and Free online Registration

Objective:

- To build this application program to reduce the manual work for managing fee and admission process.

Best Practices:
